The Hides PR

Following this trail through the Low Lands, come and explore the Hâble d'Ault, tucked away on land reclaimed from the sea.

- Time: 4 hours 20mins
- Distance: 13km
- Route: difficult

Starting at: Parking at Onival harbour, hamlet of Ault.

Ault. 32km west of Abbeville.





- 1 From the car park, walk down Esplanade de la Plage and Boulevard de la Mer towards Ault. Follow Rue de Saint-Valéry and then Rue du Moulin on the
 - At Ault: 14th century restored St. Pierre Church listed as a Historic Monument, in a check pattern of white stone and flint, with bell tower; Victor Hugo trail with views over the sea and orientation table; Turn right at the second automatic lighthouse, 25 metres high and 106 metres above sea level.
- Turn left along Chemin Mélinda passing behind the Onival Camp Site. Turn right at the crossroads.
 - In the 1900's, Ault-Onival was a well known seaside resort.
- 3 Head left and continue on to the iunction.
- 4 Carry straight on. At the junction turn left and follow the little path.
- (4bis) Cross the road and then follow

- the path opposite, heading left. At the bottom of the track, turn right to reach the domain of Hautebut.
- ► Hamlet of Woignarue.
- Turn left and follow Chaussée Blanche. Head right at the crossroads.
- © Continue and turn left when vou arrive at the Chaussée Verte. Walk around the pond.
- crossroads. Return to the pebble seawall and, following the path alongside the seawall, return to the car park.



The Low Lands were reclaimed from the sea and offer a mosaic of natural habitats (pasturelands and wetlands...) criss-crossed by paths, ditches, hedges and seawalls, or renclôtures as they are known locally. In these areas, a diverse and rare flora and fauna flourish; birds shelter and the emblematic Henson horses graze. A wall of pebbles protects the land from storms and flooding but it is vulnerable and needs to be reinforced with concrete and sheet pile groynes. The area is dotted with ponds bordered by reeds, rushes and marshlands making the Hâble d'Ault a veritable ecosystem in a natural state. A haven of peace, this paradise for birds is also home to the rare sea kale, a plant with colours worthy of an impressionist painting.
