The Cliffs PR®

Starting from one of the three "sister towns", discover the magnificent panoramic views from these chalk walls that fall straight into the sea.

Be careful: keep away from the cliff edge, risk of landslides.

(P) Time: 1 hour 30 mins

Distance: **5km**

Route: easy

Starting at: Mers les Bains esplanade, opposite the Papillons Villa.

Mers-les-Bains, 35km west of Abbeville, 8km south-west of Ault.





- Follow Esplanade de General Leclerc, which runs alongside the beach.
- When you reach the end, turn right along Rue Jules Barni. At house number 10, climb the stairs to the left towards the church.
 - ➤ The Mers-les-Bains St. Martin Church was rebuilt in 1928 and houses an altarpiece from the 17th century.
- 3 Turn left once again and heading right climb up to the statue of Our Lady of the Cliffs, also known as Our Lady of the Tide.
 - This statue was originally constructed in 1878 but rebuilt in 1955. As shown by the bas-reliefs bearing the names of the patron saints of Eu, Mers and Le Tréport, it watches over the seamen and inhabitants of these three sister towns. It also makes a good navigational point fixed points such as steeples, buildings or any other type of tall construction -

- helping sailors avoid the cliffs.
- 4 From the statue, head to the right, inland.
- ① Cross the road and take the trail opposite. Take the immediate right along a path and then turn right again heading towards the Facette District.
- Walk down the road, follow Rue du Dr Roux and then turn right along Rue Joseph Legad and return to Mers-le-Bains Church.
- O Go down the steps and return to the esplanade.

A Decorated and Colourful Seafront

The esplanade is unique in France with its 600 villas dating from the 19th century. In a profusion of styles from the "Belle Epoque" their facades are interlaced with wood and wrought iron presenting a wonderful palette of colours. The names given to the houses speak of families, flowers and the sea, while others show great originality. The seaside resort was listed as a "Secteur Sauvegardé" (preserved sector) in 1986. Mers-les-Bains - This coastal town, listed as a "Station Verte", has a freely accessed pebbled beach at high tide that becomes a 1 kilometre wide sandy beach when the tide goes out. The 2.5 kilometre long coastline at Mers-les-Bains is composed of chalk cliffs and home to a distinctive type of fauna and flora.
