The Auteux

Discover sites as pleasant as they are varied in this charming Valley of the Trie. Time: 2 hours 20 mins

O Distance: 7.2km

Noute: easy

Starting at: Place de la Mairie at Miannay.

Miannay, 10km west of Abbeville, 4km north-west of Moyenneville.

Miannay Abbeville Amiers



- Trom the Mairie (Town Hall), turn right along Rue de Cantereine and continue 50 metres. Cross the footbridge over the River Trie and turn right along Rue de Gouy-Cahon and then Rue de l'Abbaye. Cross the D925, pass to the left of the church and walk up the minor road.
 - At Miannay: St. Pierre Church, rebuilt after the 2nd World War and a fully restored 16th century manor.
- ② At the first junction, before reaching the top of the hillside, climb the path to the right and descend towards Bouillancourt. Cross the bridge over the River Trie (or cross via the ford) and join the D86.
 - St. Samson Church, in flint, from the end of the 17th century, with two stone crosses on the cemetery wall; 18th century chateau; wooden Oratory.

 The River Trie is a short river

- measuring only 13km in length; this is not through lack of water however, tens of sources like this one at Rogeant feed it as it journeys from Rogeant into the Somme Canal at Petit-Port
- 3 Turn left along the D86 and continue for 100 metres. Climb the track in front of the camp site and walk through the woods to reach the plateau.
- Just before Zoteux, turn right and follow the track that winds through the Fond des Auteux to the road.
 - ▶ The hamlet of Acheux-en-Vimeu has a very important religious past. Its name comes from the Latin word "altus" or "autel" or in its plural form "auteux", pronounced Zoteux. It is said, however, that less commendable events also took place here including paganism, the cult of the false gods, for example. On the altars, Druids

- are said to have carried out more than just harvesting mistletoe with their golden scythes.
- ⑤ Follow the road for 100 metres and, just before the Miannay signpost, follow the trail to the left. Cross the D925 and return to Place de la Mairie.

Chés letcheus d'gattes ed Zotiu

Almost every village used to have a nickname. And as jealousies and rivalries were rife in the countryside, the nicknames were more often than not mocking, rude or even slanderous. The Picard nickname for the inhabitants of Zoteux was "those pot lickers" (ces lécheurs de gamelle), mocking their poverty.... Unless it was to tax their avarice!
