The Mountain of Guizancourt

With the juniper trees and the southern-feel to the atmosphere, the Mountain of Guizancourt, maintained by the Conservatoire d'Espaces Naturels de Picardie and the municipality, is a very popular natural habitat. On the hillsides the various fauna and flora flourish to the delight of nature lovers and walkers. This is a walk that will awaken your senses...

"From the mountain we have a dominating view over Guizancourt and the River

Evoissons that snakes through the village. The shades of colour create a wonderful mosaic. The trail, surrounded by trees, is a paradise for rabbits and orchids. The site attracts a great number of walkers and families wishing to enjoy the beauty of the different surroundings (chalk-banks, rivers.) Unfortunately we are sad to say that people still park on the grass verges even though an information panel states that this is not allowed and that there is a parking area available. We must respect this natural habitat!"

Rendez-vous at Guizancourt. The starting point of the walk is situated along the River Evoissons. Cross the wooden foot-bridge and follow the trail, which will take you to the top of the hill. After having crossed the grasslands, follow the trail up to your right. You will soon notice how steep the slope is, and very soon you will notice a change of scenery. You are now in an arid area, surrounded by juniper trees, in the peace and quiet. Here, the atmosphere will make you think of the Mediterranean - and the fauna and flora will confirm it.

will come across a number of different wild orchids, such as the Lizard Orchid and the Short Spurred Fragrant Orchid, and aromatic plants such as Thyme and Oregano. In the springtime the yellow and mauve flowers of the Horseshoe Vetch colour the ground. Many insects have colonised the area: crickets, grass-hoppers and butterflies.



Change of perspective...

It is when you reach the summit of the hillside that you will appreciate the view in front of you: the village of Guizancourt and the varied landscape of the valley, with its grasslands, woods and hedgerows surrounding the River Evoissons. Leaving the chalk-banks you could return to the village by re-tracing your steps; or you could continue along the heights, following the trail that meanders towards the Chemin de Poix Valley – this circuit is about 3km long. The walk continues amongst the grasslands and agricultural land.



Going down towards Guizancourt, you will discover a multitude of landscapes: woodlands, pastures and fields separated by stretches of hedgerows and banks. Join the road to finish the walk. After you have crossed the bridge of the old mill over the Evoissons, follow up the river to come back to the starting point.

Abandoned since the 1960's, grazing was re-established in 2003 with the introduction of a flock of sheep to the site. Since then, each summer, about 20 sheep actively participate in the clearing and maintenance of the chalk-banks. This completes the work carried out at the opening of the site (clearing and wood cutting) by the Conservatoire d'Espaces Naturels de Picardie who manage the site. It should be noted that there was no need for much clearance work because of the steep slopes and the work rabbits had already carried out.



In May the chalk-banks are adorned with the bright yellow flowers of the Horseshoe Vetch.

Awaken your senses

Many types of fauna and flora more common to the Mediterranean have developed here because of the following conditions: steep slopes of limestone rock, eroded ground, little water, and much sun as the banks face the south. You

Along the trail, you may come across a Yellowhammer, a bird that likes to position itself at the top of trees to sing. Following the river, you will see delicate damselflies such as the stunning metallic-blue Jewelwing.
